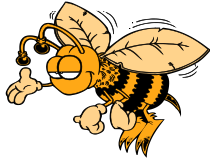

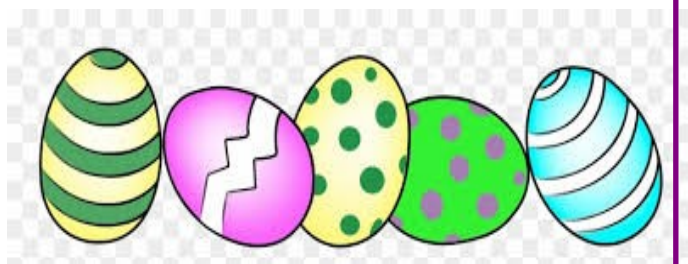
# THE BUZZ

## EASTER TRIVIA.....

1. Easter baskets have a special symbolism. The woven containers represents nests and new life, especially when filled to the brim with eggs
2. Historically. Most early Easter celebrants would have eaten lamb for this special occasion as the holiday has it's roots in Jewish Passover. Most American Easter dinners now feature ham because of the timing of the holiday. Years ago hams cured over the winter months would have been ready to serve in the early Spring.
3. Easter clothes used to be considered good luck, Old superstition held that if you wore new clothes on Easter, you would have good luck the rest of the year Many strut their stuff coming out of church, in their Easter clothes.
4. Easter eggs date back way before Easter. There's evidence showing that Easter eggs originated from Medieval Europe and Christians, may not have actually been the ones to start the tradition of giving eggs - a symbol of fertility and rebirth in many countries.
5. Eggs are dyed to represent the blood of Jesus Christ.
6. Good Friday is recognized as a holiday in only 12 states. Occurring 2 days before Easter Sunday, Good Friday commentates Jesus Christ's crucifixion, but it is not a federal holiday.

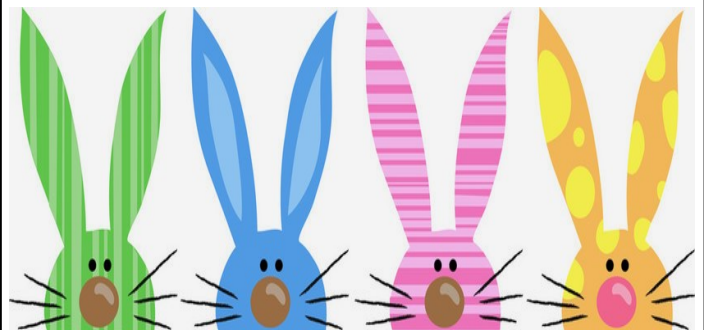

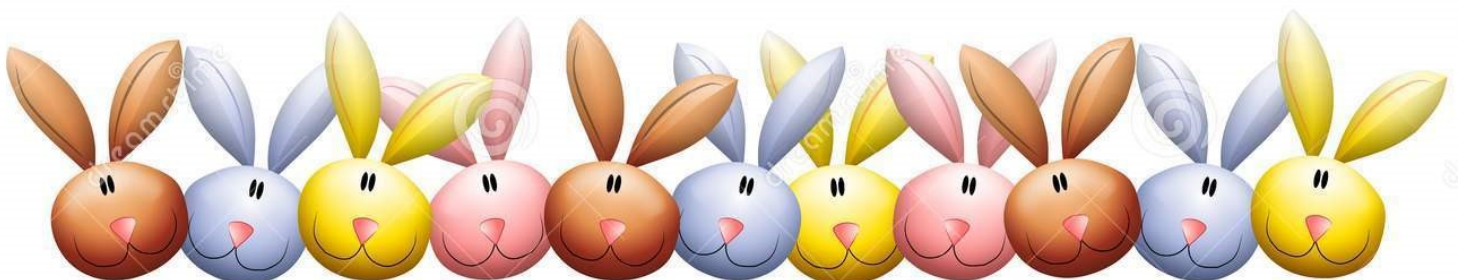

# Chaplains Corner



Spring is the season of new beginnings. Fresh buds bloom, animals awaken and the earth seems to come to life again. Farmers and gardeners plant their seeds and temperatures slowly rise. It is also the time that we celebrate the Resurrection of Jesus or “Easter” in our culture. The resurrection of Jesus Christ is the cornerstone of the Christian faith. This event, which occurred over two thousand years ago, is the best attested fact in human history, with archeological evidence, extra non-biblical manuscripts and the personal experiences of masses of people. The resurrection of Christ was predicted in the Old Testament and by Jesus Himself. During the forty days following His resurrection, Jesus showed Himself to be alive! The resurrection of Jesus was not just a moment in history for His disciples. This overwhelming event changed their lives, and their worldview. After the resurrection, they had a completely different understanding of Jesus, God’s Word and His plans. They realized Jesus was God, was alive and could unleash His power at any time.

In interesting ways, it also demonstrated why some never experience this power. For these people, the resurrection remains just a story. Even a myth or legend. These critics don’t allow their minds to view the evidence and make a decision. At the same time, some believe in the resurrection, but remain skeptical, not seeing how it makes a difference.

Luke and Paul give a bold perspective on these post-resurrection appearances of Jesus. They explain that Jesus “presented Himself alive after His suffering by many infallible proofs, being seen by them during forty days and speaking of the things pertaining to the kingdom of God” (Acts 1:3, NKJV). And in 1 Cor. 15, Paul recounts Jesus’ early appearances to His closest followers, adding that “He was seen by over five hundred brethren at once.”

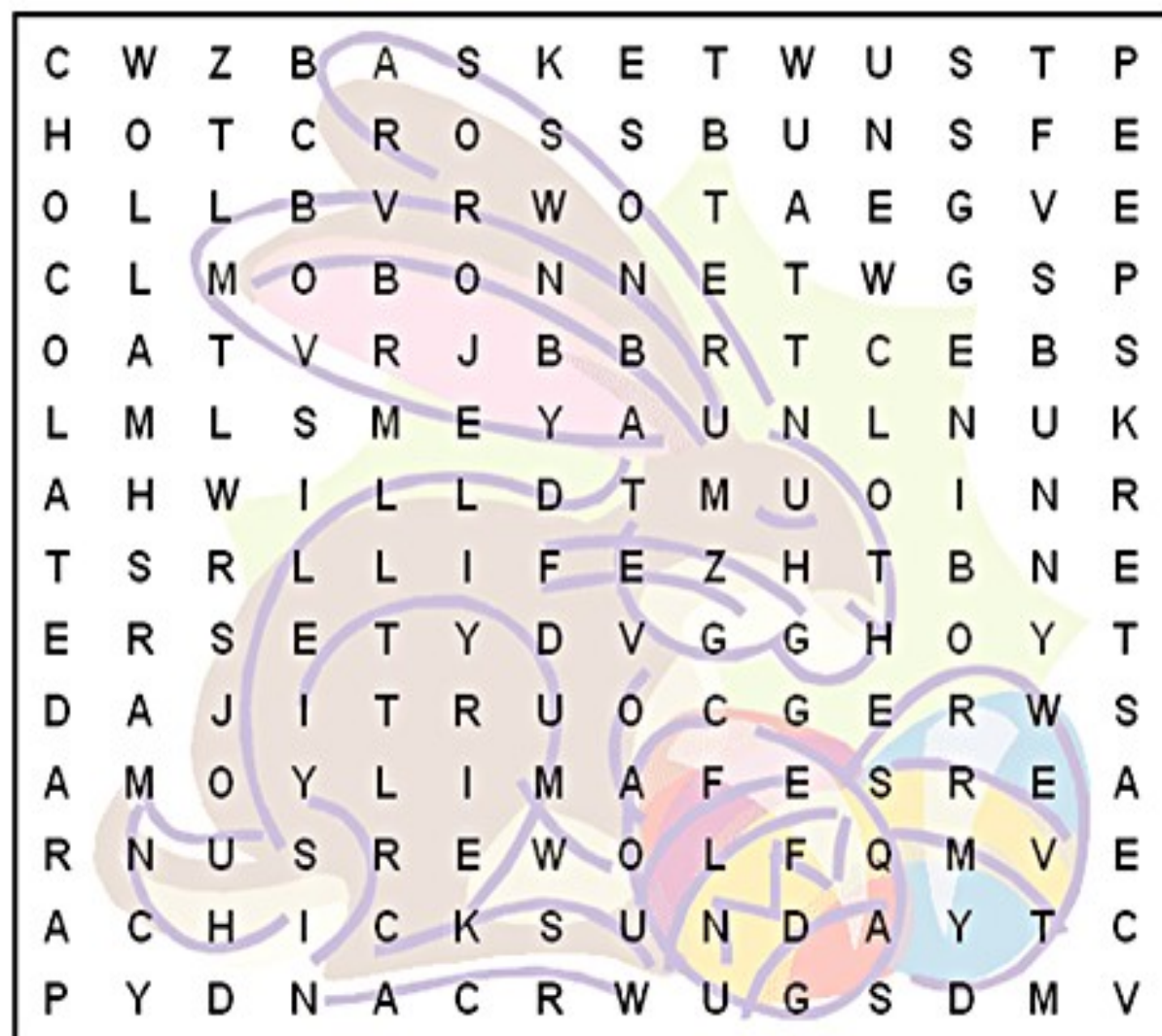
Our sins were responsible for the suffering and death of Jesus. He did not die for a political cause, or as an enemy of the state, or for someone’s envy. Jesus died for our sins. Jesus did not die as a mere martyr for a cause.

The cross is the payment for our sins, the empty tomb is the receipt, showing that the perfect Son of God made perfect payment for our sins. The payment itself is of little good without the receipt! This is why the resurrection of Jesus was such a prominent theme in the early church. So, there is hope that transgressions, sins and iniquity can be forgiven. There is hope that we can have joy, peace, assurance, and security in the midst of the difficulties of this age. There is hope because Jesus is alive! There is hope that Christ is coming back soon, that there will come someday a new heaven and a new earth, and that the Kingdom of God will reign and triumph.

Just as Spring brings hope of life, Jesus can give us hope! Our hope is not in our own ability, or in our goodness, or in our physical strength. We obtain hope by believing in the evidence about the resurrection of Jesus the Christ. Spring to life, believe in Jesus

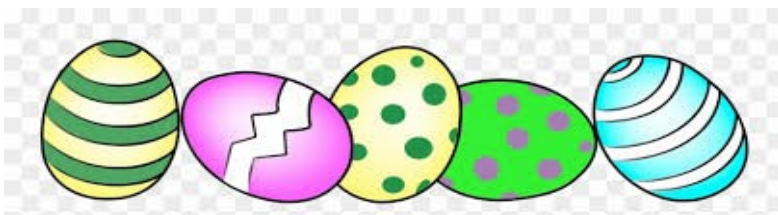
A great big THANK YOU from all of us at Cedarbrook for the work that you do to help us and our residents. Stay safe, happy and we hope to have you back with us very soon.

## Peanut Butter Easter Eggs

- 1 (16 ounce) package confectioners' sugar
- 1 cup creamy peanut butter
- 1/4 cup butter
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 8 (1 ounce) squares semi-sweet chocolate
- 1 tablespoon shortening

In a mixing bowl, combine confectioners' sugar, peanut butter, butter and milk (if needed for moisture) until blended. Shape mixture into two 1/2 pound eggs or make a bunch of smaller eggs. Freeze eggs for 1 hour. While the eggs are freezing, cut semi-sweet chocolate into small pieces and place in top of double boiler with shortening. Melt over medium heat, stirring frequently until smooth. Stick a long-tined fork in top of each peanut butter egg, dip in melted chocolate to cover then drain on waxed paper. When the eggs are cooled and set, decorate the eggs to suit your fancy.

## Old Fashioned Easter Egg Candy

- 1/2 cups mashed russet potatoes
- 1/2 cup salted butter, softened
- 5+ cups powdered sugar
- 2 teaspoons vanilla extract
- 18oz semisweet chocolate chips
- 1 teaspoon shortening (like Crisco)

With electric mixer

Combine mashed potatoes, butter, and 1 cup sugar.

Add in remaining sugar, 1 cup at a time. Stir in vanilla. Refrigerate filling for at least 1 hour. Once chilled, scoop by 1-1/2 Tablespoon and roll into egg shape and place on wax paper lined cookie tray. If dough is still sticky, chill for longer or dust your hands with powdered sugar before rolling. Return to refrigerator while you prepare the chocolate coating. Pour chocolate chips in a microwave safe bowl, add shortening, and heat at 25 second intervals, stirring well in between, until chocolate is melted. Dip eggs in chocolate to coat and return to cookie sheet (to dip. Set the egg on the tines of a fork and then use a spoon to pour chocolate ovetop and then slide egg onto wax paper lined sheet to harden). Refrigerate until chocolate coating has hardened. Keep eggs refrigerated.

## Chocolate Covered Coconut Cream Eggs

- 1 lb. powdered sugar
- 4 tbsp. butter or margarine, softened
- 4 ounce cream cheese
- 1 tsp vanilla extract
- 1 lb. flaked coconut, plus more for decoration
- 4 cups semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 2 tbsp. shortening

In a mixing bowl, combine sugar, butter or margarine, cream cheese, and vanilla extract. Stir in coconut. Form mixture into egg shapes, place on a parchment or wax paper lined baking sheet and freeze until solid. Melt chocolate chips and shortening in a double boiler on the stove or in a glass bowl in the microwave for 30 second intervals, stirring after each time, until just melted. Dip an egg in chocolate and completely cover. Remove with a fork and hold the egg over the bowl for a few seconds so any excess chocolate drips back into the bowl. Put egg on a lined baking sheet and sprinkle with additional coconut, if desired. Repeat with remaining eggs. Place eggs back in the freezer until chocolate has set.

## Chocolate Fudge Easter Eggs

- 1/4 pound butter, melted
- 2 (3-5/8 ounce) boxes chocolate pudding mix
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1 pound confectioners' sugar
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- 8 ounces dipping chocolate

Combine butter, pudding mix and milk. Bring to boiling and simmer two minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat. Add sugar and vanilla extract; stir until smooth. When cool enough to handle, shape into eggs and place on wax paper-lined tray. Chill until firm. Melt chocolate; dip cooled eggs. Place on wax paper. Let stand until coating hardens.

## Tips for Keeping Your Money and Valuables Safe



Although we discourage residents from keeping money and valuables in their room, we realize that many of you will choose to do so. Therefore, we would like to offer these tips to help you keep your money and valuables safe from loss or theft. Since you have access to the money in your account during normal business hours Monday through Friday, we suggest that you only withdraw the amount you need for immediate use. If you need larger sums of money for gifts or to reimburse your family members for purchases made on your behalf, we suggest that you contact Financial Services to arrange for payment by check. If you choose to keep money and valuables in your room, we highly recommend that you secure such items in the locked drawer of your bedside cabinet. Keep your key with you, or keep your key out of sight in a safe place. As soon as you realize that your money or property is missing, it is important to report it immediately to the Charge Nurse. Cedarbrook will not assume responsibility for replacing missing property kept by residents on their person or in their room. However, we will take action to investigate, and to try to recover your property if possible. Finally, we ask that you help us maintain a current inventory of your personal property. Any property that you purchase or receive during your stay should be added to your Valuables Received After Admission Form, including a description of the property. This information is essential when trying to locate missing items.
