

- New 240 bed 4 story wing to replace all beds in the B and C wings and nearly 50 beds in the D-Wing.
- All rooms will be semi-private (2 to a room) with a few private rooms for infectious disease isolation on each floor. There will be bathrooms with their own showers for each room.
- There will be pleasant common spaces on each floor including a sizable dining room, common room and other areas.
- The shape of each floor will be L-shaped allowing the nursing and medical teams to manage each 30 bed corridor centrally in the L. There are also care stations halfway down each hall.
- There will be new courtyards created by the new wing as well, one specifically for the E-Wing and another that sits between D and E allowing for D-Wing residents to enjoy the safety and serenity of their own courtyard.
- A connection will be made on two floors to the original center building with the auditorium, family room, and kitchen. A connector will be made to the D-Wing as well.
- There will be a floor with negative pressure and o2 connections to handle more medical complexity as well.
- Project staging, including traffic flow and such, will appear on our website in each phase.

I remember my grandparents' home, a typically modest three-bedroom house in Ohio, and how there was always a bedroom and a sitting room set apart for guests. Her six rowdy grandkids, including myself, were banned from those rooms for good reason!

Just so, at the time of Jesus' birth, a typical three-section house in Bethlehem would have had at the back of the house a special room kept just for guests. Scholars now understand that the Greek word to describe this room has often been translated into the English word, "inn," which evokes in our minds the idea that Mary and Joseph were turned away from a building that had many rooms, like a hotel.

Historians believe that Joseph likely sought a room in a typical home, from a family like his own, and it happened that the guest room in the back of the home was already being used.

The main part of a house consisted of a large room built to accommodate all the things they would do in daily life as a family: cooking, eating, sleeping. Mary and Joseph might have been able to sleep there, but because she was about to deliver her baby, they needed privacy.

The front part of the house was on a lower level, where the expensive or young farm animals were brought in to be kept safe. They also helped keep the house warm. Most likely, this was what was meant by the "stable," and that might have provided a more private place where Mary could deliver her baby, most likely with the help of the women of the house.

Let us remember that what scholars have learned should not confuse our traditions around the Christmas story but help us better to understand that God in the infant Jesus truly came into our everyday lives. God the Father did not present his Messiah, the Savior, in a place apart, in a guest room in Bethlehem, but a place among us, a real home, with the kids playing and grandma scolding them while mother cooked the meal and father fed the animals. All this, and with guests in the house during the hardship of a census ordered by Rome's oppressive rulers.

Theologian Shirley Guthrie reminds us that the Son of God was born in a particular time in history, in a particular place in the world, to a poor family in the lineage of King David; and it is not just doctrine or a religious idea, but a real historical event, that in Jesus Christ the eternal God came into the real world in which we live. In Jesus, God becomes one of us, an infant, a child, a teenager, a man, so that in his humanness he could show us his divine love, that in the fullness of both his divinity and his humanity he would release us from the darkness of our sin to the eternal life with him. God in Christ left his home in order to bring us home.

In Jesus Christ, who he is and what he says to us in Scripture, God himself speaks his mind. Jesus says in John's gospel, "in my Father's house are many rooms; if it were not so, would I have told you that I go to prepare a place for you? And when I go and prepare a place for you, I will come again and will take you to myself, that where I am you may be also." (14:2-3)


Those are not idle words; Jesus means what God himself says. God wants us in his house, filling up the many rooms Jesus describes to his disciples. Together, let us bless God for the gift of his Son, a gift which gives us life and light, and a promise of a place forever in his eternal home.

FREEDOM FROM RESTRAINTS -

You have the right to be free from physical or mental abuse, corporal punishment, involuntary seclusion, and any physical or chemical restraints unless they are required to treat your medical symptoms and are not used for purposes of discipline or for the convenience of staff. Restraints may only be used to ensure your physical safety or the safety of other residents. These limitations must be based upon the written order of a physician which specifies the duration and circumstances which require such restraints.

• **Visitation-** CMS now allows visitation at all times for all residents, but has certain stipulations:
*The facility is required by CMS to still maintain physical distancing, particularly during peak visitation and disallows large gatherings. As such, we are limiting in-room visitation to 2 visitors per resident. If there are more than 2 visitors for that resident, visitation will need to be conducted in overflow areas – preferably the family room or the closed B2 unit (or the Chapel for a B3 or C3 resident)
*If one of the residents in the room is unvaccinated or immunocompromised, the visit should not be conducted in the room. There will be a symbol at the resident room denoting if one of those factors applies to assist families with choosing the right visit location.







- **Vaccinations-** CMS announced mandated staff vaccination requirement goes into effect in December.
- Supplies— Due to supply chain shortages we have had to make some modifications to our supplies ex: cups, lids, food selections.

 - Calibration of the heating system was completed and set points were changed. Facilities will continue to monitor resident room temperatures.

 Jason responded work will begin soon on creating a parking lot in the back of the building where the old juvenile building had been.

- The next meeting will be held Monday, December 13, 2021 at 2:15 pm in the Auditorium.






