He was dropped off at the shelter with no record of anything. They said he was about 2, but it's an educated guess about his age.

looking for an adult cat to adopt. Clover's picture was used on the website of the shelter I was looking at. His eyes looked so sad. I called that day and went to see him by myself. Chaplain's Corner

"By wisdom a house is built, and by understanding it is established; by knowledge the rooms are filled with all precious and pleasant riches. (Proverbs 24:3-4)

Betty Kreitz, a Resident of Cedarbrook-Fountain Hill, recalls with love the family home in Oxford, NJ, which her father built, a home in which she grew up. She then lived there with her husband and family for nearly 60 years. It is a place where she cherishes the rich memories her parents provided for her, just as in the verse from Proverbs.

Betty's earliest memories are of her loving and hard-working parents, and of attending Sunday school and church. Her parents raised her to love and obey God, to care for the family, and to do good, honest work. Sadly, Betty's parents both passed away by the time she was 16. Her parents left the house to her, and there she raised her three younger, school-age siblings, caring for them while she herself continued to attend high school. She supported her family by working full-time at the Dixie Cup factory after classes every weekday.

Just as her parents had taught her, Betty kept house and made sure her siblings had their meals, clean clothing, and went to school. Her siblings had daily chores and helped keep the house and the family together.

And, of course, just as her parents had done for her, Betty continued Sunday School and church attendance and made sure her siblings went too. They might argue with her, but she insisted that they go. Over the next few years, Betty and all of her siblings stayed together until each one graduated from high school. Betty continued to keep the house and work full time.

This was a great burden for a young person, but her parents, by their example, made sure that Betty could handle it. To this day, she is grateful to her parents for the life-lessons they taught her, for giving her the ability to take on responsibilities, and for helping her to understand that all she does is for God.

One day, Betty went to a local roller-skating rink. There she met one of her friends, who introduced her to a young man named George Kreitz. Betty could see right away that George was a good roller-skater. Betty, however, was not. They were introduced and spent the rest of the day at the rink, with Betty holding onto George as they skated round and round and talked.

They met a few more times over the coming days. One day, about a week after they'd met, George (who called her "Bet") said to her, "hey, Bet, do me a favor...will you marry me?" Betty remembers looking him in the eyes, and with a big smile replied, "Yeeaaahhh!"

So, a couple of days later they got married by a Justice of the Peace. Family and friends said it was not going to last. But they were in love, and George told Betty, "When I saw you, I knew I wanted you." Betty says that remembering George's words brings tears to her eyes, and even today, he calls her "my angel."

George still lives in the home in Oxford, with their daughter who cares for him. This house is filled with precious and pleasant memories for Betty, not only of her life with George and her daughter, but also of her parents, whose wisdom and understanding gave her all she needed to love God and others throughout her life.

ACCESS AND VISITATION RIGHTS -

You have the right to say who may or may not have access to your nursing facility for the purpose of visiting with you. This includes your family, relatives, or others. Also, you have the right to immediate access by your attending physician or any representative of the federal Department of Health and Human Services, the state Departments of Public Welfare and Health, and the Department of Aging Ombudsman Program. Organizations or individuals providing health, social, legal, or other services may, with your consent, have reasonable visits with you.

Who was Saint Patrick?

Was there really a Saint Patrick. Definitely. Did he really drive the snakes out of Ireland? Probably not, since snakes weren't native to Ireland.

St. Patrick was born in Britain as Maewyn Succat. At age of 16 (around A.D. 400), he was kidnapped from his home on the west coast of and carried off to Ireland to become a slave who worked as a shepherd. After 6 years, he escaped; upon returning home, he received his call (in a dream) to preach the gospel. He spent the next 15 years or so in a monastery, preparing for his missionary work. When he became a priest, his name was changed to Patricius, and eventually, Patrick. Although some Christians lived in Ireland at the time, it was Patrick who spread Christianity throughout the land and brought an organized church into existence.

The Shamrock

We wear a shamrock on St. Patrick's Day because, legend says, St. Patrick used its three leaves to explain the Holy Trinity. [The Trinity is the Father, the Son, and the Spirit as three divine persons who are one divine being (God).] The truth of the St. Patrick legend, however, is in question, as there is no direct record that the saint actually used the shamrock as a teaching tool.

St. Patrick's Day Facts, Fun, and Folklore

Blue was the color originally associated with St. Patrick, but green is now favored.

St. Patrick's Day, March 17, is the traditional day for planting peas.

Cabbage seeds are often planted today, too, and old-time farmers believed that to make them grow well, you need to plant them while wearing your nightclothes!
