

DIETICIAN NUTRITION

Tips for Longevity and Protecting the Planet

- > Conserve water- The less water you use, the less runoff and wastewater that will eventually end up in the ocean. The little things can make a big difference. Every time you turn off the water while you're brushing your teeth, you're doing something good. Got a leaky faucet? You might be dripping as much as 90 gallons (340 liters) of water down the drain every day. So, fix it! Avoid drinking bottled water. Switch to filtered tap water. You'll save cash and help reduce a ton of plastic waste in the process.
- > Shop wisely- Buy less plastic and bring reusable grocery bags. The statistics are shocking: People around the world buy 1 million plastic drinking bottles every minute and use up to 5 trillion single-use plastic bags every year. Hardly any plastic only about 9% gets recycled. A staggering 68 to 219 million tons of plastic is currently in our oceans. Break the cycle. Say no to plastic shopping bags and use cloth bags instead. Don't use plastic straws. Drink from a reusable cup instead of a disposable plastic one.

For longevity try:

- Honey- Too much sugar can be bad for your health. It's a major ingredient in ultra-processed foods, which are linked to higher risk of cancer, heart disease, and more. Enjoying a bit of unprocessed honey provides antioxidants and helps reduce cholesterol.
- Beans- Their soluble fiber can cut cholesterol and help prevent type 2 diabetes by stabilizing blood sugar. A study found eating beans 4x/week cut heart disease by 22%. Another found people lived approximately 8 more years for a 20-gram intake of legumes.

- ✓ Have stained coffee mugs? Sprinkle the inside with baking soda and scrub with a moist cloth. Stains will disappear.
- ✓ Sprinkle a teaspoon of baking soda on the bottom of your toaster oven to eliminate the burned smell from drippings and crumbs.
- \checkmark A paste of baking soda removes red sauce stains from plastic containers. Who knew?
- ✓ Clean any funky smells from your refrigerator with a solution of 1 teaspoon baking soda to 1 quart of warm water.
- ✓ A pinch of baking soda in your scrambled eggs will make them fluffier. Try it!
- ✓ Here's one to try if your sweet tooth is calling. Dissolve 1 teaspoon of baking soda in a glass of warm water. Rinse your mouth for a few seconds, spit it out and your craving should disappear instantly! Definitely gotta do this!


EMPLOYEE PET OF THE MONTH

Scoutie or Scoutie girl


Fun facts about your pet or the breed...

Come Holy Spirit, fill the hearts of your faithful

and kindle in them the fire of your love. Send forth
your Spirit and they shall be created. And You shall renew
the face of the earth. O, God, who by the light of the Holy Spirit,
did instruct the hearts of the faithful, grant that by the same Holy Spirit
we may be truly wise and ever enjoy His consolations, Through Christ Our Lord,
Amen.

Welcome April! Welcome Spring and warm weather! Welcome neophyte (the newly Baptized!) Welcome Holy Spirit to the hearts of your people! Bestow upon them your gifts as we enter into Mystagogy!

April is filled with renewal and new life both on the Earth and in our risen Christ as he has eternal life with the Father. The newly baptized have been washed of their sins and made "New." We Christians can renew our baptismal promises to refresh our spirit.

Now is an exciting time as the Earth comes back to life after its winter sleep; the baptized will enter a time of mystagogy.

The fourth stage of the <u>Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults</u> is called "mystagogy," from the Greek words meaning "to lead through the mysteries." Traditionally, mystagogy extends throughout the Easter season until the feast of Pentecost. This is a period of accompaniment for new Catholics as they discover what it means to fully participate in the sacramental mysteries of the Church. The newly baptized are called "neophytes," from the Greek words meaning "new plant," because the faith has been newly planted in them. Even though their catechetical preparation has been completed, they still have much to learn about what it means to live as Catholic Christians. During Mystagogy, new Catholics will reflect on their experience of conversion, learn more about the Church, and consider how they might get involved in ministry and outreach. Neophytes will need the ongoing support of the community so that the faith newly planted in them can grow deep roots. The RCIA coordinator in your parish probably noticed your faithful service and thought that you would be an excellent role model for your community's neophytes. Joining them in a mystagogy session gives you an opportunity to share your faith with them and encourage them as they continue their own new journey of faith.





Fresh Strawberry Cake

Jam-packed with fresh strawberries, this strawberry cake is one of the simplest, most delicious cakes you'll ever make.

INGREDIENTS

1½ cups all-purpose flour, spooned into measuring cup and leveled-off
1½ teaspoons baking powder
½ teaspoon salt
6 tablespoons unsalted butter, softened, plus more for greasing the pan
1 cup plus 2 tablespoons sugar, divided
1 large egg
1 teaspoon vanilla extract
½ cup milk (low fat is fine)
About ¾ pound strawberries, hulled and halved











BEFORE BAKING





FRESH OUT OF OVEN

INSTRUCTIONS

- > Preheat the oven to 350°F and butter a 9-inch deep dish pie pan (or 9-inch round cake pan).
- > In a medium bowl, whisk together the flour, baking powder and salt. Set aside.
- In the bowl of an electric mixer, beat the butter and 1 cup of the sugar until pale and fluffy, about 3 minutes. Add the egg and vanilla and beat on low speed until well combined.

 Gradually add the flour mixture, alternating with the milk, and beat on low speed until smooth. (Note: the batter will be thick.)
- > Transfer the batter to the prepared pan and smooth with a spatula. Arrange the strawberries on top, cut side down, so that they completely cover the batter (the recipe calls for approximately 3/4 pound of strawberries; use more or less if necessary).
- > Sprinkle the remaining 2 tablespoons of sugar over the strawberries. (Don't be tempted to omit the sugar here; it balances the tartness of the berries and forms the deliciously crisp crust on top of the cake.)
- > Bake for ten minutes, then reduce the heat to 325°F and bake until the cake is lightly golden and a tester comes out clean, about an hour.
- Let the cake cool in the pan on a rack.
- > Serve with sweetened whipped cream or vanilla ice cream, if desired.
- > Cake can be stored at room temperature for several days, loosely covered.






