CHAPLAIN'S CORNER

Question: What does it mean to love? What does it mean to love someone when they don't love you back? What does it mean to really love one another?

Hello residents, families, staff and friends of Cedarbrook. It is my hope and prayer that today's letter encourages each of your hearts as you continue to allow God to speak to each of you in his own special way as he sees fit. I'd like to draw your attention to a very special topic called "Command to Love One Another as Christ Loved us." Scripture tells us according to the gospel of John 3:16 that "For God so loved the world that He gave His only begotten Son..." Understand that love equals sacrifice and if we want to truly love the way God commands us, then we need to make the ultimate sacrifice and that means we all must die to our mortal flesh. Let me share with you all three types of love that is found in the Bible. The first one is called:

1. **Eros Love** - is the Greek term which actually means desire and longing. This kind of love is associated with lustful love. Eros love is based on the strong feeling we have against one another and it usually develops during the 1st stage of a romantic relationship.

God created physical attraction between a man and a woman, but He never intended for it to be selfish. He created "desire and longing" which makes up lustful love which is crucial in any marriage. Since this type of love is mostly based on self-benefit, many people tend to fall out of love if they are not happy with the marriage.

- 2. **Philos Love** Now this kind of love is like the one you have for a companion or pal. It refers to loving one another just like your brother or sister. This love is for a pal who is really close and dear to us and it is characterized by various different shared experiences between two people. In fact, this is kind of love that many Christians tend to practice towards one another, and although "philos" love is really wonderful, it is not that reliable, since it can end up souring at times as we have all experienced at some point in our lives.
- 3. Agape Love Now this kind of love is a special term which represents the "divine-love" of the Lord towards His Son Jesus Christ, the human beings and all believers. This is the best of three types of love in the Bible, in fact Jesus himself showed this type of divine love to His Father in Heaven and humanity.

Agape love is the love that God commanded all believers to have for everyone whether he or she is a believer or not.

• <u>Agape love should never be determined by our feelings</u>; it is more of a set of behaviors or actions. With agape love, <u>you do not have to actually feel it for you to give</u>, which means that you can be able to show love without feeling anything at all. At times, feelings can follow after showing this kind of love.

What does this all mean? It means that if we all reevaluate our way of loving one another according to God's way, we would come to a greater understanding that life in which God created and intended it to be will give us all a greater fulfillment in experiencing his 'Agape Love' in every aspect of our life according to His perfect divine will. You will begin to experience the power and transformation like no other. You will come to the Spiritual knowledge that you met with God because you allowed his Son Jesus Christ to touch your heart.

I implore you all "Do not let your heart be troubled. You believe in God; believe also in me" (John 14:1).

May God bless you all and may your hearts be filled with great joy and gladness as you put your total trust in your creator.



Thank you, Karen, for your lifelong commitment to caring for others and for all you continue to do for the Cedarbrook community!




LEMON BLUEBERRY POUND CAKE



INGREDIENTS-FOR THE CAKE

- •1/2 cup milk
- •1 tablespoon grated lemon zest, packed
- •2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice (Note: You'll need 2 large lemons for the entire recipe. Be sure to zest them before you juice them.)



- •1/4 teaspoon baking soda
- •1/4 teaspoon salt
- •1 cup blueberries (if using frozen blueberries, do not defrost)
- •1 stick (1/2 cup) unsalted butter, softened
- •11/4 cups granulated sugar
- 2 large eggs



- •3/4 cup confectioners' sugar
- •1/4 teaspoon lemon zest, packed
- •11/2 tablespoons fresh lemon juice





INSTRUCTIONS

1. Preheat the oven to 350°F and set an oven rack in the middle position. Spray a 9x5-inch metal loaf pan with nonstick cooking spray. Line the bottom of the pan with parchment paper, then spray the pan again.

2.In a small bowl, whisk together the milk, lemon zest, and lemon juice. Let sit for at least 10 minutes while you proceed with the recipe. (It will curdle; that's okay.)

3.In a medium bowl, whisk together the 2 cups flour, baking soda, and salt. In a small bowl, toss the blueberries with the remaining teaspoon of flour. Set both aside.

4.In the bowl of an electric mixer fitted with the paddle attachment (or beaters), cream the butter and sugar on medium speed until light and fluffy, 2 to 3 minutes. Scrape down the sides of the bowl, then beat in the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition. Scrape down the sides of the bowl again. With the mixer on low speed, beat in a third of the flour mixture, then half of the milk mixture. Beat in another third of the flour mixture, then the remaining milk mixture, followed by the remaining flour mixture, scraping the bowl as necessary. Add the flour-dusted blueberries to the batter and, using a spatula, fold until evenly combined. 5.Transfer the batter into the prepared pan and smooth the top.

6.Bake for 50 to 60 minutes, until the cake is golden brown and a tester comes out clean. Let the cake cool in the pan for about 10 minutes, then turn out onto a rack to cool completely.

7. Make the glaze: In a small bowl, mix together the confectioners' sugar, lemon zest, and lemon juice. Add more confectioners' sugar or lemon juice as necessary to make a thick but pourable glaze (it should be a little thicker than you'd think, about the consistency of molasses or honey). Spoon the glaze over the top of the cake, letting it drip down the sides. Let the glaze set for 10 to 15 minutes before serving.
