She will review the consent form and services that you are requesting. CHAPLAIN'S CORNER



On a shelf in Pat Stuber's room at Cedarbrook-Fountain Hill stands a statue of Our Lady of La Vang. It depicts the vision of the Blessed Mother holding the Infant Jesus as she appeared to Vietnamese Catholics of La Vang village in 1798. Like so many apparitions, or visions, of Mary over the centuries, she reflects the people to whom she appears. Our Lady of La Vang appears as a young Vietnamese woman holding her child, both with dark hair and eyes, and wearing traditional Vietnamese clothing.

Pat was raised in a devout Catholic family—her parents and seven children—whose faith upheld them in difficult times. When she was a teenager, her mother gave birth to her youngest brother, John Michael. He passed away at age 2 from a heart defect. Pat had cared for him and when he died, she felt as if she had lost her own child.

Better times for Pat came a few years later when she met her husband Danny and eventually moved to California and gave birth to their son, Sean. Then Pat began to have health problems which would lead to her not being able to have any more children. A few years later they returned to this area, found work, and also took up fostering children through the Catholic Social Agency.

When the US government began resettling Vietnamese refugees in the United States, the agency told Pat and Danny of four young Vietnamese brothers who would need foster care in the US. The boys' parents decided to send them to the US to escape being drafted into the Vietnamese Army as teenagers. Without hesitation, Pat and Danny agreed to foster all four. In a matter of months, they gained four Vietnamese "sons": Hanh, Cong, Cuong, and Dung.

The Vietnamese boys were also Catholic, so Pat and Danny drew upon their faith—and especially their devotion to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph—for strength and guidance. Pat recalls this prayer: *"Dear Jesus, Bless our family. Be so kind to give us the unity, peace, and mutual love that you found in your own family."* Pat and Danny prayed that the bonds of love in the Holy Family also be within their own.

Their faith in God brought many blessings to their family. Their son Sean and his "brothers" bonded seamlessly, making friends, and playing soccer. Through hard work and guidance from Pat and Danny, the boys adapted to their new life. Pat and Danny took their sons on trips so that they could learn about America's past and see that people from many other lands had come to the US seeking freedom. Pat laughs when she remembers how she seemed to be constantly training the four Vietnamese boys to speak English, and that even today, as adults, she corrects their pronunciation.

Pat's husband Danny passed away in 2014, but not before they were both able to experience the joy of all five of their son's weddings, and to see the beginnings of their families. All the sons have successful careers and live happily with their wives and children around the country, coming together at holidays to visit with their mother, Pat.

The apparition of Mary and the Infant Jesus appeared to the Vietnamese villagers when they were enduring violent persecution for their faith in the late 18th century. The vision of Mary gave them courage and strengthened their Catholic faith. Pat says the choices she and Danny made to take up the refugee boys reflected their devotion to God and to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. God and the Holy Family gave them the courage to open their lives and their home to the boys who were suffering under an oppressive regime in Vietnam. Pat's faith story shows us the power of prayer and of trust in God to provide the love we need to nurture our families and each other.

SLOW COOKER CREAM CHEESE TACO DIP

With football starting and baseball in full swing, invites to sports parties are coming! This dip is a true crowd pleaser and so easy to make.

The crockpot will keep this dip hot for as long as your party lasts.
(Or until the dip is gone. I'll let you guess which is more likely to happen first.)

INGREDIENTS

- 1 lb. lean ground beef
- 2 (8 oz each) packages cream cheese, softened
- 1 (16 oz) package Velveeta cheese
- 2 cups salsa
- 1 (4 oz) can diced green chilies
- 1 packet taco seasoning
- Tortilla chips, for serving



PREPARATION

1. In a skillet, brown ground beef over medium-high heat, breaking it apart as it cooks.
2. Drain and transfer to a slow cooker. (3-4 quarts works well.)
3. Add cream cheese, Velveeta, salsa, green chilies, and taco seasoning. Cover and cook on low, stirring occasionally, until hot and melted, 1 1/2 to 2 hours.
4. Serve with tortilla chips and enjoy!
