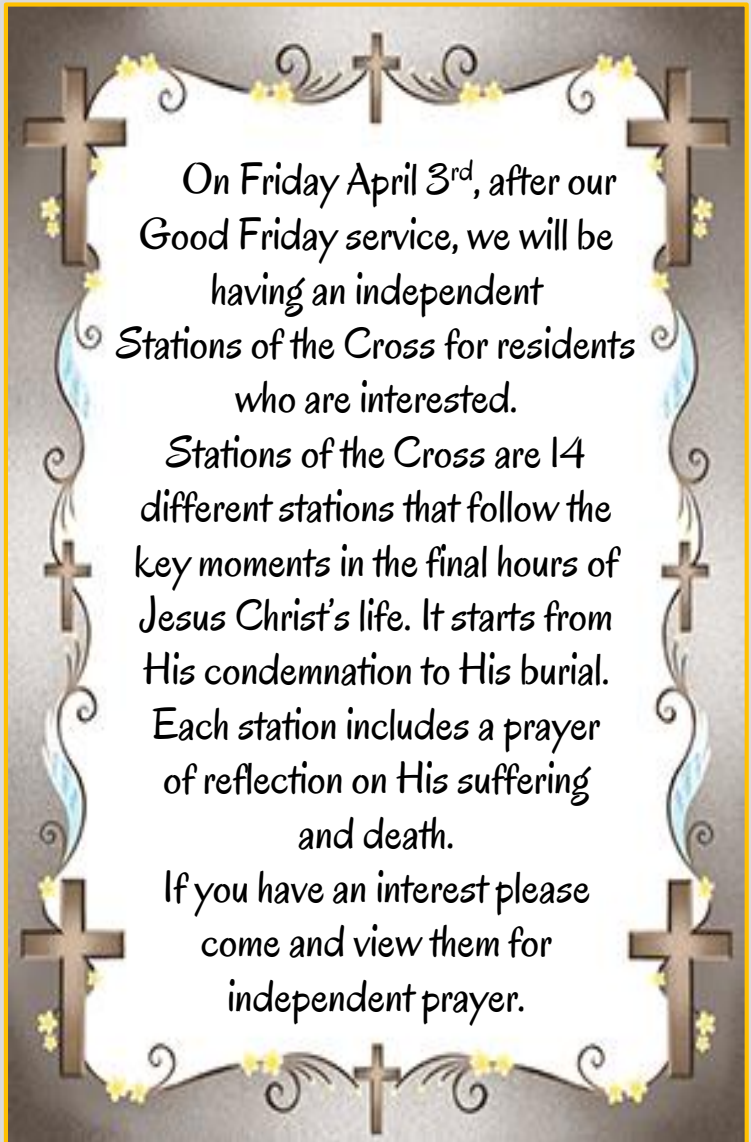

If you have an interest please come and view them for independent prayer.

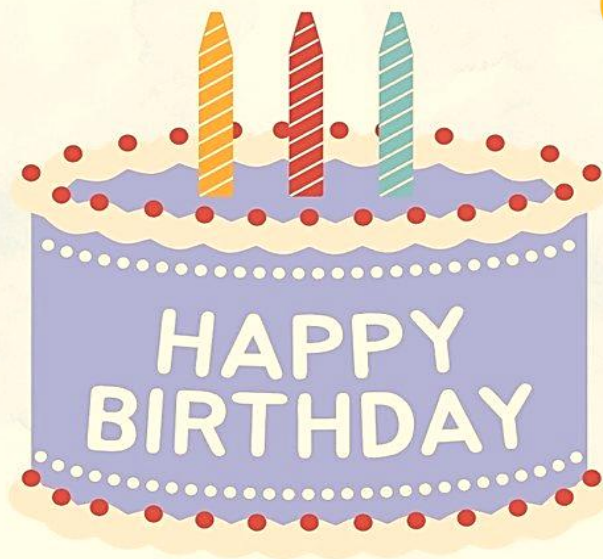

# Residents' Council Meeting Minutes Monday – March 9<sup>th</sup>, 2026

- Karen Snyder, Vice-President, read the Resident Rights for March.
- Jean Larison, President, welcomed new residents admitted in February.



## **TRANSFER AND DISCHARGE – Sec. 1919(c)(1) and (2)**

You cannot be transferred or discharged from your nursing facility except in an emergency; the nursing facility ceases operations; you may endanger the health and safety of the other residents; nonpayment of your share, if any, of your cost of care; improvement in your health to the point where you no longer need nursing facility care; or an urgent need for medical services the nursing facility cannot provide. Except for an emergency or your urgent need for medical services the nursing facility cannot provide, the nursing facility must give you and a relative or other responsible person you have named, 30 days advance written notice of your transfer or discharge. The nursing facility must arrange for your safe and orderly transfer to a site where your needs can be adequately provided for, and the nursing facility must thoroughly prepare you for your upcoming transfer or discharge. Transfer or discharge does not mean movement of a resident to a bed within the same certified facility.

# Heavenly Honey Cake



When choosing honey to use in this cake, go for your favorite variety, noting that each type will yield different results. A deeper amber honey will usually have a stronger flavor (and will give a bit more color to the frosting). For the most nuanced flavor, floral honeys like orange blossom can add citrus notes, or a clover honey will offer a subtle sweetness.

No matter what kind of honey you use, you'll enjoy a little slice of heaven at the end.



## Ingredients:

Baking spray with flour

3 1/2 cups all-purpose flour

2 1/2 tsp. baking powder

3/4 tsp. table salt

1/2 tsp. baking soda

1 1/4 cups granulated sugar

1 cup unsalted butter, softened

4 large eggs, at room temperature

1/2 cup honey

1/2 cup sour cream

1 cup whole milk

## Directions:

**Step 1:** Preheat oven to 350°F. Spray 2 8-inch round cake pans with baking spray. Line the bottom of the pan with parchment paper, then spray again.

**Step 2:** Whisk together flour, baking powder, salt, and baking soda in a medium bowl until combined. Beat butter and sugar together in a large bowl with an electric mixer on medium speed until light and fluffy, 3 to 4 minutes. Add eggs, beating well after each addition. Add honey and sour cream, beating until combined. With mixer on low speed, add flour mixture alternately with whole milk, beating well after each addition. Divide evenly between prepared pans and spread into an even layer.

**Step 3:** Bake in preheated oven until a pick inserted in the center of the cakes comes out clean, about 33 to 38 minutes. Let cool in pans on wire racks 10 minutes, then turn out of pans and let cool completely, about 1 hour.



## Whipped

### Mascarpone-Honey Frosting:

3/4 cup honey, plus more for drizzling

1/2 cup unsalted butter, softened

1/4 tsp. table salt

1 (8 oz.) container mascarpone, cold

1 cup heavy whipping cream, cold

## Directions:

**Step 1:** To prepare frosting, beat honey, butter, and salt in a stand mixer fitted with the whisk attachment until creamy, about 2 minutes, scraping down bottom and sides of bowl as needed. Add mascarpone, beating just until combined, about 30 seconds. Transfer to a separate large bowl. Add cream to mixer bowl and beat on medium until stiff peaks form (do not overbeat), 2 to 3 minutes. Fold whipped cream mixture into mascarpone mixture until combined.

**Step 2:** Place 1 cake layer on a cake plate and spread about 1/2 cup frosting over layer.

**Step 3:** Top with second layer. Reserve 1/2 cup frosting. Spread remaining frosting over top and sides of cake.

(Optional) **Step 4:** Spoon reserved 1/2 cup frosting into a piping bag fitted with an open star tip and decorate top of cake.

**Step 5:** Refrigerate 1 hour before serving. Drizzle with honey to garnish.

## HOUSEHOLD USES FOR SALT

Salt certainly makes our food more flavorful—and it can also work to fix many of our unexpected challenges around the house. Here are some of our favorite household uses for salt.



### Best Uses for Salt in the Home

Apply a paste of salt and olive oil to the ugly heat rings on your table. Let it sit for about an hour, and then wipe it off with a soft cloth.



Rub salt on fruit-stained clothes while still wet, then put them into the wash.



To clean a sticky clothing iron, sprinkle salt on a piece of paper and run the iron over it a few times while the iron is hot.



For mildew spots, rub in salt and some buttermilk, and then let dry in the sun.



Pour salt directly onto a grease spill and come back to it later.



Cover spilled raw eggs with salt, then wipe clean with a paper towel.



A new broom will last longer if you soak the bristles in hot saltwater before using it for the first time.



For perspiration stains, add enough water to salt to make a paste, then rub into the cloth. Wait an hour, then launder as usual.

Rub 2 to 3 tablespoons of salt onto the stains inside your glass vases, and then scrub clean with a damp bristle brush.



Gargle with warm saltwater (¼ teaspoon of salt to 1 cup of water) to relieve a sore throat.



When silk flowers get dusty, put them into a paper bag with several tablespoons of salt and shake gently for 2 minutes to clean them.



Sprinkle salt on carpets to dry out muddy footprints before vacuuming.



Stainless steel can be cleaned by rubbing it with a gritty paste of 2 tablespoons of salt mixed with lemon juice. Rinse well and pat dry with a soft cloth.



If you spill wine or fruit juice on your tablecloth, pour salt on the spot immediately to absorb the stain.



To kill unwanted weeds growing in your driveway or between bricks and stones, pour boiling salted water over them.

To restore some of the color to faded fabric, soak it in a strong solution of salt and water.



A mixture of salt and vinegar will clean brass.



Salt on your fingers when cleaning meat or fish will prevent your hands from slipping.



To freshen smelly sneakers (or any canvas shoe), sprinkle salt into them. Wait 24 hours for the salt to absorb the odor, then shake them out.












Refresh household sponges by soaking them in cold saltwater for 10 minutes.
